From the Editor

Over the last month I have started several editorials and discarded all of them. Writer's block is very frustrating. Something has been bothering me for some time and that is the lack of



involvement of younger dentists in the stewardship of organized dentistry. I know that with the debt load that most young dentists have piled up, it is hard to justify time out of the office particularly spending that time in meetings.

I began my involvement locally in North-Central Minnesota in early 1972 by joining a Tri-County Dental Society that met in Alexandria, MN. We met about six times a year in the evening and had dinner and a 1 to 3 hour CE program. We had a broad group of members and it was great to be included as a young dentist in the camaraderie that existed in this organization. The hour drive over and back with at least two if not the other three dentists from my small town was priceless. We were good friends and positively influenced each other in improving our skills and the care we provided to the community we served.

As is the way with most dental organizations, you get your feet on the ground and then they make you President. The Tri-County Dental Society gave me an avenue to pursue more CE. I brought in one

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and two day CE programs that I did everything for and they were successful. At that time the only regular CE programs available that were not University sponsored were at the Minnesota Dental Association meeting in the Twin Cities once a year. There were not the varied speakers and topics that we see today. After three years of "running the show" in my outstate area, I was burnt out. However, thanks to my leadership success in the Tri-County, I was appointed to the MDA committee that accredited the dental assisting and dental hygiene programs in Minnesota. This was really interesting because the committee traveled within the state spending two days at a time evaluating the programs, making suggestions, and then followed up to see that they were complying.

Beginning with my move to Colorado in late 1976 and lasting for twenty years I concentrated on CE and local study group or district dental society leadership there, in Upstate New York and finally in Kansas.. ACTION SUMMARY

Academy of General Dentistry

Dental Practice Council October 22-23, 2010

- 1. <u>Constituent Engagement:</u> Educating, engaging and enrolling constituent leaders and members in advocating on matters of great importance to the practice of dentistry has been an ongoing but critical challenge for a number of years. The council undertook the following actions, among others, to address this challenge:
 - a. Drafted key points of a constituent communication plan for the AGD Board;
 - b. Formed the council's Publication Subcommittee consisting of the chairpersons of each of the council's other subcommittees for the purpose of leading communications efforts on their respective subcommittee matters, with the other subcommittees being Third Party (Dental Benefits), Informatics, Access & Public Health, and Workforce; and
 - c. Resolved to produce both talking points and canned articles for easy access by constituent leaders, especially editors, for use in their own publications.
- <u>Access to Care</u>: The council revisited the AGD's Access to Care White Paper and discussed how to address the dynamic nature of the ongoing considerations of the solutions of the white paper. To meet this objective, the council resolved that the DP and LGA Councils produce a **State of the Solutions Report** periodically, reporting on the status of adoption and results of the approximately 30 solutions listed in the AGD Access to Care White Paper.
- 3. <u>Workforce:</u> With numerous iterations of independent midlevel providers looming throughout the nation, the council took a fresh look at workforce issues:
 - a. The council met with the LGA Council for a presentation by Dr. Gary Oyster on the history of the dental workforce and on building positive relationships with legislators and other influential persons;
 - b. The LGA and Dental Practice Councils formed a joint LGA-DP Subcommittee on guidelines/parameters for expanded functions/duties of auxiliaries;
 - c. The council assigned a task force to investigate, among other things, telemetric dentistry, including its scope, levels of supervision, and impact on access;
 - d. The council resolved to produce workforce articles on domestic/foreign models and on the efficacy of EFDAs out of its Workforce Subcommittee's report; and
 - e. The council resolved to revisit AGD's workforce policies prior to its next meeting.

<u>Other Issues</u>: The council also reviewed and discussed numerous issues, including: dental benefits concerns, Code on Dental Procedures and Nomenclature, dental informatics, corporate dentistry, evidence-based dentistry, bisphenol A, fluoride, amalgam, Botox, dental tourism, teeth whitening, calcium phosphate, environmentally-sound practice ('green dentistry'), and tax reporting.

ACTION SUMMARY

Academy of General Dentistry Legislative & Governmental Affairs Council October 22-23, 2010

- 1. The Legislative & Governmental Affairs (LGA) Council was honored to have the Dental Practice Council and many key leaders of the AGD present to hear **Dr. Gary Oyster discuss the evolution of the midlevel provider issue.** Dr. Oyster also recapped the shortcomings of some of several existing pilot programs as well as some of the challenges that these programs could present. **AGD remains committed to the position that a two-tiered dental care delivery system is detrimental to the public's well-being.**
- 2. The council met with Mr. Patrick O'Connor, president of AGD's new lobbying firm, Kent & O'Connor. Discussion focused on potential outcomes of the upcoming elections as well as legislative and regulatory topics of particular interest to dentists, both as health care providers and as small business owners. They reviewed the goals of the April 2011 Government Relations Conference (to register, contact Cindy Nygren at cynthia.nygren@agd.org) and stressed the need for attendees to be trained on lobbying locally since much activity, especially that which relates to the midlevel provider issue, will take place at the state level.
- 3. Members recommended that AGD send a **representative to testify at the FDA's hearing on amalgam** in December 2011. The council recommended former AGD President Dr. Vinny Mayher to deliver that testimony.
- 4. AGD will continue to pursue the acceptance of a renewed **Memorandum of Understanding** (MOU) with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) for Healthy People 2020, which is expected to be released in December 2010.
- 5. The council will **continue to advocate for representation of general dentists on panels convened to address oral health matters**, such as the Institute of Medicine's Oral Health Initiative Report and their Oral Health Access Report. Preproduction reports on both topics are expected in the first half of 2011.
- 6. The council suggested that the Executive Committee review and officially **support the National Dental Association (NDA) Position Paper on Access to Care and Mid-Level Providers for Underserved Communities**.

The LGA council is committed to increasing the current level of communication about its efforts to represent general dentists since those actions support efforts to retain and recruit members. Some of the suggestions for increasing visibility included: enhanced photo coverage of council meetings and relevant conference: **building stronger partnerships with other constituent officers**, such as editors and PIOs, in order to promote and report on various issues and successes. The council **formed a subcommittee to recommend topics for future print and online articles**. Members also expressed interest in **working with Marketing to survey members**, assess their awareness and interests, and then to develop communications pieces that respond to those needs.

From the Editor: Access issues are hot in Kansas and I expect they are everywhere. The AGD White Paper On Access is another example of the work that the AGD is doing for General Dentists. See this:

More than 6 million days of bed disability, 12.7 million days of restricted activity, and 20.5 million days of lost work each year are the result of illnesses related to oral health. Yet, most oral health problems are preventable with a prevention model that includes: oral health literacy, sound hygiene, and preventive care available through the dental team concept.

To voice the concerns of general dentists against independent mid-level providers and to provide real workable solutions to solve the access to oral health care challenge, the AGD has developed and adopted an official policy on access to care.

Trustee Report

As of August, 2011, AGD membership fees for full paying dues members is up \$12K over 2010 which is from 37 additional members. General Dentistry Online version is a more thorough/thicker version than the printed version. Plans to be brought to BOT at Winter 2011 board meeting for online media posting. AGD addressing the move that some of the "specialist" organizations are placing on their websites/printed material for their "expertise" within their specialty statements.

AGD is working with AAPD(pediatric dentistry asso) to see if we both can come to similar policy on the midlevel provider issue. Preliminary discussion since the July BOT meeting has helped to gain clarity on the potential "hand holding" is still on going thru ADA Annual session last month in Orlando.

AGD is recommending that each state attempt to provide an AGD presence at your state dental board meetings at least once per year. Other discussions about representation of AGD, I suggested that the AGD, as well as all local AGD constitients, remember that the dentists are the dues paying members of the organization & the docs should receive the full representation of our group. We are not in the business to harm the public.

AGD BOT resolved that the principles in the Austin's Group adopted Statement of Purpose consistent with existing AGD policy including the AGD White Paper on Access to Care.

Formation of taskforce to see the potential for doing the outreach event as an ongoing project for the AGD at each annual meeting.

Do not forget to share with all our dental colleagues the AGD White Paper & the AGD Position on Workforce Issues (both located on our home page at <u>www.agd.org</u>). These items are the answers to the discussion of workforce & patient care. Let's not create a 2-tiered dental healthcare delivery system.

2010 AGD Annual Session Wrap-Up

2010 AGD Annual Session was held here in Region 12 in the "Big Easy", New Orleans. It was hot & humid as any summer is in NO. First, I want to thank Kay Jordan & all the Local Meeting Planning Committee members from Region 12 for all their work to make this meeting a success. The AGD was shown lots of Southern hospitality & tastee' fare, especially compared to the usual spice of life for the visitors' palates. Kay even went so far as to have a pre-meeting get together at her home. Let me say that was some great food. Kay showed off her Southern hospitality in a grand way.

This meeting was the first time that the governance & scientific sessions were separated. It made for a long week for those the had to participate on both sides of the session. As for our Region 12 participation throughout the week, our region had *GP Heartland - Winter 2010 -* 8 a large number of hosts for the different speaker for the scientific session. The verdict is still out on how the change in session layout, by separating the governance & scientific session, improved attendance to the CE. The meeting planning staff at national is hoping that the AGD will draw more non-AGD members to the annual session by having the CE at & thru the weekend after the governance. This way the AGD can be seen as the premier CE sponsor for dentistry without the concern for guest dentist worrying about any potential concerns with the politics of the Academy.

This year the Academy, along with the AGD Foundation, sponsored an Outreach event at & with the LSU School of Dentistry during the annual session, Thursday July 8th. This Outreach event was similar to "MOM" or "DAD" projects that some of you may have already participated in within your local areas. The SOD provided/volunteered the physical plant & even some of the dental students assisted with treatment prep. There was a sign-up for dentists & dental hygienists before arrival to Louisiana & the SOD so that these participants could be cleared thru the LA State Dental Board to be "licensed" for the 1 day of treatment at SOD only. This project was blessed by good participating dental teams & patients.

Support from Dr Gremillion, dean of the SOD, to assist with finding the patient base for this large endeavor. Also I want to thank the Louisiana Dental Board. They worked with the AGD staff to "clear" all the licensees for professional liability coverage & local state dental board issues. There was even 1 of the LA Dental Board members as an Outreach provider. The final dollar amount of treatment has yet to be calculated but

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we were able to see a large number of patients for treatment of operative, oral surgery, perio & dental hygiene needs. Live updates were provided to the HOD during the last day of governance. You can be extremely proud of the Outreach Event. The AGD & AGDF are planning for another event in San Diego. You will be hearing more about this Outreach event as we get plans finalized.

There were a few changes to the Constitution & Bylaws changes. First, the Canadian region was combined into Region 15-16 by Resolution 110 a & b. This will allow the eastern side of the country constituent(s) to assist the western side of the country get that constituent back up & going as a viable CE provider & constituent. The longterm goal of this resolution is to get both sides of Canada back to separate constituents as quickly as possible. As with many constituents, there is a leadership vacuum to move the AGD forward.

AGD PAC was debated in reference committee. "Due to the inroads" that the AGD has made with ADA, the HOD voted to not pursue an AGD PAC. The opposing view that was presented during the reference committee was what is the AGD going to do if the ADA follows thru with the Board resolution #8/midlevel provider at the October 2010 ADA Annual Session. As a follow-up to this discussion, the AGD HOD resolution #307 stated that the AGD is not in favor of any mid-level provider treating dental patients.

The AGD still strongly supports that the dentist is the dental team leader. Not supporting that any other "provider" of dental treatment of irreversible procedures. I believe that we dentist need to use the verbiage of "surgical/non-surgical" versus "reversible/irreversible" procedures. This discussion is already a public discussion. The public is the forum that this issue needs clarity. The difference between reversible/irreversible procedures is not clear to the public. The public does understand surgical/non-surgical procedures. We are removing diseased body parts & restoring them to form & function. Check with your medical general surgeon/physician friends to see how they respond to what you do. This should be a great time for you to help the medical world appreciate what you do for the human situation.

Lastly, Region 12 had 20 Fellows & Masters this year. CONGRATS!!! to these doctors for your accomplishment. Oklahoma received honorable mention in the Membership category for their size. Congrats to Bob, Susan & the entire OKAGD. Great job. This is incentive for the rest of Region 12 Constituent to work toward these awards for 2011.
